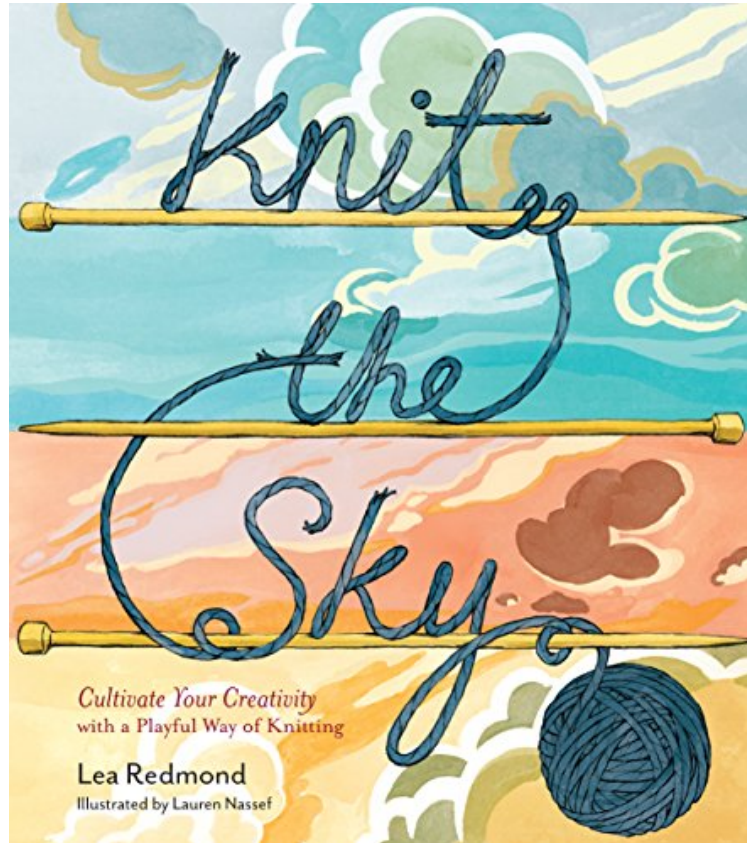

It simply means that you knit a row or a square every day, thinking about its inspiration. Colours play a big part here. Lea seems like an ordinary person trying to stretch her art and find meaning. It is a pretty book, but it is not a handbook. My biggest disappointment was that she chose not to insert photos of her own works. The projects in it are very unique and allow for a nice degree of personalization. Unlike many knitting books this one has no photos of finished projects which is just what I expected from a book that is more about process than product. It's a different approach that I am really enjoying.
